Spiritual Communion

What is this?

The church has an ancient practice known as "Spiritual Communion." A Spiritual Communion is different from an actual or Sacramental Communion in which we receive the real presence of Jesus in the Holy Eucharist.

To make a Spiritual Communion is to make a "communion of desire" when receiving the Lord in Holy Communion is not possible. Pope Saint John Paul II was a great advocate of Spiritual Communion. He wrote in his encyclical *Ecclesia de Eucharistia:* "It is good to cultivate in our hearts a constant desire for the Sacrament of Eucharist. The Church recommends making Spiritual Communion as often as possible."

There are many prayers that can be used to make Spiritual Communion and to stir up a holy desire for that union with Jesus. The most famous prayer which is the one we recite is by St. Alphonsus Liguori, founder of the Redemptorist Order. My Jesus, I believe that you are present in the most Blessed Sacrament. I love You above all things and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot now receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You.

Never permit me to be separated from You. Amen.

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In the Presence of Fear

We are in the presence of fear; fear for the present and fear for the future. How could our world have become so disoriented since Christmas – our churches closed, our schools silent, our businesses and commerce disrupted, our sports abandoned, planes grounded and people impounded.

The shattering of life on planet Earth recalls the story of David and Goliath: a tiny piece of matter has brought the gigantic structure of modern civilisation to its knees and left us scientifically unable to conquer the coronavirus in an age of science and technology. In the presence of fear, we can be tempted to question the presence of God.

Where are you? We remember the cry of Jesus on the Cross. "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" Jesus cried recalling the words of the psalmist. Easter, this year, was desolate, church closed and empty, Mass and ceremonies available only on TV and radio, whereas Easter should have been a celebration of our togetherness in a shared faith and hope in the love of God, which raises from the dead and gives strength in the battle with all. At Easter, we remember the presence of fear in life; Jesus was in agony in the garden as he faced the crucifixion. We are in the garden of fear now and Jesus is with us in that garden. God was with Jesus on the

Cross even as he cried out about being forsaken.

God is with us now and Jesus, the resurrected Good Shepherd, will carry us through these fearful times if we honour and do our best for each other. The spirit of togetherness, the evidence of caring, healing and loving, the millions of acts of kindness and helpfulness bear witness to the Spirit of the Good Shepherd. We hope we will learn to appreciate each other anew when corona has lost its power and thank God for the spirit of co-operation and togetherness and the great work of so many of our people who cared for us that brought us through.

It is a time for prayer and care.
